The iSchool@UBC had a very strong showing at the Association for Information Science and Technology (ASIS&T) Conference and Annual Meeting. Seven faculty and nearly a dozen students attended the four day meeting, held November 1-4 in Seattle, Washington. Included in the conference proceedings were the 1 paper, 3 interactive panels, and 4 posters by iSchool students and faculty. In addition, faculty and students

organized and attended workshops and symposia, participated in the student design competition, and took on new leadership roles in Special Interest Groups (SIGs).

Dr. Jennifer Douglas joined the iSchool Faculty as a lecturer in September 2014.

Why did you decide to come to **UBC?**

I decided to come to UBC because as a graduate of the MAS program, I have a deep respect for the depth and breadth of the program here. In a program with as many courses as UBC offers, I can teach - in addition to the basic functions of archival management such as arrangement and description and public service courses like Advanced Arrangement and Description and Personal Archives that dig a lot deeper into issues and innovations.

What is one interesting fact about vourself?

In addition to the archival research I'm working on, I also work on a voluntary basis with a community-based participatory research project that is exploring the experiences of bereaved parents of stillborn babies in order to help identify gaps in services and to inform the provision of bereavement support, health policy around bereavement care, and training programs. We have presented our findings at a number of medical conferences and it is interesting for me to think it was pretty overrated. What is the best part of your job?

The best part of my job is when a class really gets going in discussion. For example, my Personal Archives class can really let loose sometimes and I love hearing different opinions and ideas, especially when they are controversial or particularly interrogative of archival foundations. I also love seeing MAS students gain confidence and a sense of professional mission and pride as they progress through the program.

What is the last thing you read for enjoyment?

The last thing I read for enjoyment? I am very proud of myself for managing to keep up with my New Yorker subscription. This takes some dedication! I also just finished reading The Goldfinch by Donna Tartt. I was a bit torn in my opinion of it: I loved parts of it, thought other parts were pretty mediocre, and though in the end I decided it was a decent read, I have to admit I each day!
